Jo Levine is a juried member of two professional artists' cooperatives – the Studio Gallery in Washington, DC, and the Middle Street Gallery in Washington, Virginia – as well as being represented by Dwell Fine Art and Craft in Hume, Virginia. Artist's Statement

I take photographs because I can't *not*. I am always scanning my surroundings, and when I see something intriguing, I feel compelled to capture and preserve it. My tastes are eclectic: usually parts of buildings, trees, leaves, and flowers, as well as broad landscapes. I am inevitably drawn to small details – the elements that transform ordinary scenes into surprising, abstract designs.

I print my own photographs in order to control their quality. A final print may require as many as ten intermediate test prints before I get the desired result. Although I may remove some unwanted elements from an image, I do not usually "Photoshop" my prints – what the viewer sees is what my camera saw.
